The Ypsilanti Freighthouse, a historic building located in Depot Town, is currently in the final stages of its Patronicity campaign to raise funds to complete the rehabilitation of the building to open it up again for public and community use.

If this campaign is successful, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation will contribute an additional \$50,000 to this project. Like other crowd-funding programs, there are various rewards available to contributors, including naming rights for benches and use of the Freighthouse for private events.

2015 AIA Michigan and Mlplace "MISSING MIDDLE" Michigan Housing Design Competition

AIA Michigan a sponsor for an open Design Competition intended to spur the development of creative, mixed-income, and affordable "Missing Middle" Michigan Housing Developments in our State's Downtowns and along key transit corridors. Millennials, Gen Xers and senior citizens across the country are among the growing audiences talking about their needs for more diverse and affordable housing options that better fit urban lifestyles.

In Michigan, architects, designers and urban planners are being challenged to put this new version of the American Dream into action as part of an innovative contest that is believed to be a first-of-its-kind event nationally. The goal of the 2015 Michigan "Missing Middle" Housing Design Competition - which is open to all contestants nationwide and offers a \$10,000 top cash prize and two additional cash prizes of \$5,000 each - is to promote awareness about the mismatch that exists between U.S. housing stock and shifting demographics combined with the growing need for walkable urban living.

The phrase "missing middle" refers to housing sites such as duplexes, fourplexes, bungalow courts, mansion apartments, live/work units and courtyard apartments. These types of housing have rarely been built since the early 1940s due to regulatory constraints, the shift to auto-dependent patterns of development, and the incentivization of single-family home ownership.

"As the demand for living in urban environments continues to strengthen across Michigan and throughout the nation, the need to accommodate the growing contemporary housing market has become much more apparent," said American Institute of Architects (AIA) Michigan Public Policy Director Dennis King, FAIA.
